Three Days For Us, But A Lifetime For Them

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Imagine living in a shack made out of aluminum sheets and plastic. Imagine having no electricity. Imagine having, at most, one hour of water a day and the only time you could shower was when it was raining. This is how the people in the village of San Gabriel live.

This past November, Interact (an after-school club that provides service work for the community) visited a village in Escuintla called San Gabriel. We were working with an organization called Recycled Lives, a non-profit organization that builds homes for indigenous Guatemalans in need – and by "in need" we mean the poorest of the poor. We committed our time to Recycled Lives, to help build a house (a one-room, square building with one window and one door) for a single woman and her son, teen brother and blind father.

Our work consisted of three long and hard, but very rewarding days. There were ten of us, ranging from 7th graders to 9th graders. Every morning we would make the one hour drive from Antigua to Escuintla. We would leave cool, lush Antigua with our fleeces zipped up and by the time we arrived to hot, humid Escuintla we were down to our t-shirts and ready to work. The days were filled with mixing batches and batches of concrete, filling cracks, painting walls, nailing boards, digging trenches, and laying the floor. By the end of the first two workdays we were covered from head to toe in concrete dust and dirt. By the end of the third day, we were covered in paint. We were truly exhausted mentally and physically, our hands were cracked and blistered, but we each felt a sort of rewarding pride that only comes with genuine hard work.

This experience has really, truly stuck with me. I have done service work in poor communities before but this was by far the most impoverished community I have ever witnessed. It was nearly impossible for me to put myself in their place or imagine living under those circumstances. The opportunity to make this community even the tiniest bit better made me feel like I had accomplished something really important. It also made me realize how much need there is in the world. I am so fortunate to come from a loving family, healthy and secure with a roof over our heads. I wholeheartedly intend on doing more service work like this throughout my life to help make the reality of a dry, safe, and comfortable home possible for the millions of people who deserve it.

This experience not only made an impact on the family we built a home for, but it made an impact on me.

POVERTY

What are some words that come to mind when you hear the word "POVERTY"? Close your eyes for a moment and think about it.

The most common responses are: hunger, homelessness, dirty, malnourished, lonely, unfortunate, sad, a lack of clothing, food, clean water and shelter. The majority of "first world" responses are focused on the lack of things that are material in nature.

When asking persons living in poverty this same question their responses are often quite different. Typical responses are of emotional and psychological connections: Lack of dignity, feeling inferior, having no voice, worthlessness, nothing, broken, frustrated, down, ashamed and degraded.

I share these differences in responses so that our hearts can be opened to some truths about poverty and to do something to change it. According to Merriam Webster's simple definition; poverty is defined as "a lack of something". "Something" is a big deep ocean of needs. Whether living in abundance or living on the streets, I am sure each of us can relate to lacking something. After all, we live in a fallen and broken world. The truth is, some form of physical, emotional and/or spiritual poverty touches each and every one of us. Poverty doesn't just come in the form of lacking "things" but poverty can exist in other ways; the lack of feeling sufficiently loved, the lack of being able to perform to the expectations of others, the lack of looking a certain way, the lack of just one more hug from a deceased loved one or the lack of a loving relationship with Jesus. The truth is, no matter what form of poverty one experiences, it is ugly and it hurts.

As we all know, working with persons living in poverty calls us to assist in helping to meet their basic needs for food, shelter, education, healthcare and prayer support. We at Recycled Lives also believe that working with the poor requires us to work in faithful and humble dependence upon God's will to care for these physical needs while we also introduce solutions for any spiritual and emotional poverty we encounter. He calls us to tell others of the reconciling power of a genuine relationship with Jesus. He is the source to ease our suffering and comfort us when we are drowning in that ocean of lacking with His never ending and perfect love.

Jesus provides us with many tools and opportunities to show people Him....and to ease their poverty. Often times this is through blessing us with sufficiency so that we have extra to care for the need that someone else has. The most important tool He gives us as a believer is the desire be intentional about choosing to delight in and honor Him by seeking ways to live generously in our words, thoughts, actions and material blessings. He blesses us with all sorts of abundance and our proper response should be that of generosity and thankfulness in caring for those suffering from poverty.

Please take some time to pray about your response to poverty and to read & meditate on 2 Corinthians Chapter 8
